Folk gets in the festival spirt at Organetto concert

olk at the Maltings becomes part of the IOFringe when it stages Organetto, a concert featuring smaller members of the organ family, from 8pm next Friday, July

The line-up includes Leveret, a trio including leading players of free reed instruments, some of the smaller members of the organ family. Made up of Andy Cutting, Rob Harbron and Sam Sweeney, Leveret will be supported by young melodeon player Saul Bailey and local trio, Said the Maiden.

Leveret is a new trio with melodeon player Andy much in demand both as soloist and accompanist. Sam is the fiddle player in Bellowhead and 2015 BBC Radio 2 Folk Musician of the year and Rob has virtually reinvented the English concertina.

Each is regarded as a master of their instrument and has worked with a huge range of artists before deciding to come together as an instrumental trio. Leveret's music is firmly rooted in the English tradition but each performance is improvised, ensuring that no two shows are ever the same.

St Albans-based vocal trio Said the Maiden is making waves on the national folk scene. Jess Distill (vocals, flute, whistles, ukulele), Hannah Elizabeth (vocals, violin, accordion, mandolin) and Kathy Pilkinton (vocals, guitar, clarinet) sing traditional and contemporary

English, Irish and American folk songs, creating their own arrangements, often in acapella three-part harmony. Saul Bailey, from North Herts,

Saul Bailey, from North Herts, plays mainly English traditional music on melodeon and English concertina and was a finalist in 2014 and 2015 in the St Albans New Roots event for young musicians. He enjoys experimenting with old and new folk tunes mainly from England, with some influences from overseas.
